





10 Factors That Affect Correct Spark Plug Heat Range

A "hot" spark plug has a longer insulator that prevents heat transfer into the water jackets. It keeps more heat in the tip of the spark plug, which helps burn off combustion chamber deposits. But if there's too much retained heat, the engine will experience preignition. A "cold" spark has a shorter insulator and retains less heat at the tip end—but if it's too cold, deposits accumulate and eventually the plug will short out (known as "fouling").



Spark plug heat range is the relative temperature of the spark plug's core nose. Critical factors involved in choosing the correct spark plug heat range include:


- **1. Air/Fuel Mixture:** Lean air/fuel ratios raise cylinderhead temperatures, requiring a colder plug. Rich air/fuel ratios require a hotter plug to prevent fouling. Mixtures that cause the plugs to read lean might contribute to preignition or detonation.
- **2. Spark Advance:** Ignition timing has one of the greatest effects on heat-range choice. Advancing timing raises combustion temperatures, calling for colder plugs. Retarding the timing lowers combustion temperatures, calling for hotter plugs.
- **3. Compression Ratio:** Increasing the mechanical compression ratio raises cylinder pressure, resulting in higher cylinder temperatures. The higher the compression ratio, the colder the spark plug needs to be. According to Champion Spark Plugs, for normally aspirated, gasoline-fueled engines, a good rule of thumb is to go about one heat range colder for each full point in compression ratio increase from 9:1 through about 12.5:1, and two heat ranges colder for each point increase between 12.5:1 and 14.5:1. Beyond 14.5:1, 3-4 heat range reductions per point may be needed.
- **4. Gasoline Quality:** With leaded fuels, the lead is attracted to the hotter (core-nose) part of the plug, causing

- glazing. Running a slightly colder plug helps prevent this. On today's cleaner-burning, oxygenated, unleaded gas, an equivalent engine needs to run about 1-2 heat ranges hotter plug than originally specified (many plug makers have revised their catalog listings for legacy applications to reflect this reality).
- **5. Methanol:** Alky-fueled engines need a plug at least one step colder than "normal" for an equivalent gasfueled motor.
- **6. Nitrous Oxide:** Nitrous raises cylinder temperatures and might require a plug at least 1-2 heat ranges colder for race engines. Lower output street systems might be able to use the standard plug recommendations if you use nitrous oxide only for short bursts (less than 10 seconds).
- **7. Supercharging/Turbocharging:** With increased chamber pressure and temperature, boosted engines need two or more heat ranges colder plugs. Extreme high-boost, race-only apps may need a surface-gap plug.
- **8. Sustained Acceleration:** Prolonged acceleration or high-speed driving raises temperatures and calls for colder plugs.
- **9. Elevation:** Leaning the mixture and advancing the timing partially compensates for lost power and efficiency caused by higher elevation. Spark-plug heat ranges should stay the same as at sea level, unless racing above 3,000 feet, where one step hotter usually suffices.
- **10. Engine condition:** Hotter plugs can crutch a worn engine suffering from worn or leaking piston rings or valve guides—for a while.



The cold Champion C57HCX racing plug (right) has a shorter insulator tip that helps prevent tip overheating and preignition in high-speed engines. A hotter plug such as the RC12YC street plug (left) has a long insulator tip; it holds more heat and tends to burn off deposits.

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
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The Brazos River

What Year Am I--Answers from page 4:

- 1974 The 1974 Corvette saw the disappearance of the chrome bumper (front or rear). Molded bumpers were here to stay, but the 1974 rear bumper was a two piece bumper. This was changed to a one piece unit in 1975.
- 2. 1976 The air extractor vents on the rear deck were removed in 1976.
- 3. 1975 Was the last year of the convertible and the first year with push bumper extrusions added to the front and rear of the car.
- 4. 1973 Was a transition year from the chrome bumpers to the molded body color bumpers of today.
- 5. 1977 The 1976 was the last year the Stingray script would be found on the Corvette. The nose emblem was changed to the now familiar crossed flags.
